EXTRACT FROM THE LAW

"If any person shall, contrary to the regulations of said officers, and after notice thereof, enter or pass within the bounds so fixed, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding five dollars, to be recovered on complaint in behalf of the State in any Court competent to try same, for the use and benefit of the society."

NOTICE

RV's, Travel Trailers (tent, P/U, tow type), and Motor Homes shall all be self-contained units or hook to Fair's sewer connections. Due to recent changes in the Department of Health Rules and Regulations, fairgrounds and parks have been restricted for the disposal of sewage and grey wastewater and other material involving health hazards.

It will be the responsibility of the owner to dispose of sewage properly. Any domestic water connections to these units must have an air gap fixture between the hose and the unit, also known as vacuum breaker. There can be no grey water drainage.

Any unit and owner found to be in violation of these two (2) Rules will be expelled from the Association Area property. Anyone found in violation will be subject to a fine as per the Department of Human Services Ruling, effective the first day of violation. Upon receipt of the parking fee a permit will be issued.

No Carnies in Livestock Area.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Federal law requires that we report to the Internal Revenue Service prizes, awards, or premiums paid to any individual or partnership if the amounts paid aggregate \$600.00 or more. We are also required to provide the Federal Identification (E.I.) number or Social Security number of such persons. If we are not furnished the E.I. or Social Security number or are furnished an incorrect number we must withhold 20% of the amount to be paid.

Accordingly, it is most important that all persons furnish us with their numbers if exhibiting or participating in fair activities where premiums or prizes may be awarded.

General Rules and Regulations

Exhibitors are requested to carefully read every line in this book and govern themselves accordingly.

- 1. All property must be entered in the name of the *bona fide* owners and, with the exception of draft classes open to the World, must be owned and kept in possession of the exhibitor fifteen days previous to the Fair. Satisfactory evidence of ownership must be shown at the time of entry. The return of property to former owner, either directly or indirectly, within fifteen days from close of the Fair shall be sufficient cause for the withholding of all Premiums to that exhibitor. All grain, fruit, vegetables, dairy products, household and mechanical manufacturers must be raised or made by the exhibitor thereof.
- 2. Dairy and Beef are by invitation only, Sheep entries should be made on or before September 1st. Sheep, Dairy and Beef cattle, including cows, must be on the Show grounds in the places assigned to them by 12 noon Sunday and remain until released. Each exhibitor may show over two animals in single class but will be paid only two monies.
- 3. All entries in Division 2 should be made on or before Sept.1.
- 4. All articles intended to be entered for premiums in the Third and Fourth Divisions must be entered on the Secretary's book on **Friday between 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Saturday between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.** and placed on exhibition, except cut flowers, which must be on exhibition before 12:00 noon Sunday. Space should be reserved ahead for flowers.
- 5. All articles entered for a premium must have a card attached to them with the numbers and name of the exhibitor, as entered on the Secretary's book, and must remain on exhibition until 7:00 A.M. the next day after the Fair is over. Premiums forfeited if articles are removed before this time or if exhibitors or interested parties interfere in any way with the awarding judges. Articles not picked up after the Fair is over will be disposed of.
- 6. *Positively* no entries will be allowed after the entry books leave the Secretary's office. Judges will see that this rule is not violated.
- 7. Show Oxen and Steers competition is open to the World. No person or company can enter for premium more than one herd and two groups of the same breed in any class. No person shall act as a judge for awarding prizes for which he is in any way a competitor. The Judge shall, in all cases, withhold premiums when the animal or article is NOT of a Superior Quality, even if there is no competition, and shall award according to his judgment. Competitors to be weighed by breed.
- 8. Before entries are accepted in 2023 all Pulling Horses, Ponies and Cattle have to be identified by tattoo or some other type of identification. This is in accordance with a meeting held April 9th, 1976 in Augusta by Maine Fairs Superintendents of Livestock.
- 9. Except under the terms and rules of Divisions 1 and 2, no person residing without the limits of the Society shall compete for premiums except diplomas. Mt. Vernon and Vienna are within this Society's limits. Division 3 is open to a permanent resident of the State of Maine.
- 10. Any person who shall knowingly violate the regulations of the Society or shall seek to obtain a premium by false pretenses or improper interference with judges, State Veterinarian or State Official or any person exercising cruelty or using profane or obscene language shall be excluded from competition and forfeit all prize money.
- 11. Dogs are prohibited from the grounds.
- 12. For registered stock competing for a premium, there shall be presented registration and transfer papers of said animals.
- 13. SAFETY OF EXHIBITS Though the Association will take reasonable precautions to

ensure the safety of articles sent or brought to the Exhibition, yet it must be distinctly understood that owners themselves must assume all risk. Should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, while the Association will give the assistance in its power toward the recovery of same, it will not make any payment for the value thereof.

Entries in any division can be made by mail, and such will receive careful attention. The secretary will be at his office, Franklin Park, Friday, September 16th. Exhibitors are urged to send entries early and avoid the rush on Saturday.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR DOMESTIC ANIMALS AT FAIRS, LIVESTOCK SHOWS, AND EXHIBITIONS INCLUDING HARNESS RACING:

- A. Cattle from all countries may show without Brucellosis or Tuberculin test prior to showing, providing the herd is not under quarantine.
- B. Domestic animals, offered for show or exhibition at any fair, or livestock or poultry show, or exhibition showing evidence of external parasites, foot rot, shipping fever, warts or other diseases may be excluded from, ordered removed, or otherwise handled as the Director of the Divisions of Animal Industry may direct. It is recommended that all cattle be vaccinated for IBR and P.I.3 within six months of the show.
- C. All domestic animals originating outside the State must meet the same requirements to show as are required for entry into the State.
- D. All Maine equines, assembled at Shows, Fairs, Race Meets, Pulling Exhibitions, or other such functions that the Commissioner of Agriculture may designate, shall have been officially tested and found to be negative for equine infectious anemia and accompanied by a report certifying that said test was conducted within three years from the time that the blood was drawn; exception: nursing foals under 6 months of age.

The person or persons in charge of the Shows, Fairs, Race Meets, Pulling Exhibition, or other such functions that the Commissioner of Agriculture may designate, shall ascertain that a copy of the official test accompanies each equine, and such reports may be available for inspection by an agent of the Commissioner of Agriculture upon request. Failure to furnish such reports shall exclude equines from the events.

Rule IX, Section 13(a) of the Rules and Regulations of the Maine State Harness Racing Commission is hereby deemed to be incorporated herein by reference and applicable to all horses assembled at a Harness Race Meet, including but not limited to, standard- bred horses, lead ponies, marshal mounts, stallions and brood mares. Harness Racing Commission personnel may assist in the enforcement of this regulation insofar as they are permitted and authorized by law.

Whoever violates this regulation shall be punishable as provided in 7 M.R.S.A., 1706.

These rules and regulations shall be published once in the Daily Kennebec Journal, printed in Augusta, Maine. This amendment became effective March 15, 1976.

Lot Breed Registered Name Exhibitor

This is an ADGA Sanctioned Show. Exhibitors in the past have requested show officials to process AGS paperwork to assist them in qualifying for AGS Championships. On January 27, 2008 HOMDGA adopted the following policy: For AGS show wins, the AGS member will bring the appropriate paperwork filled out (except for judge and secretary part.) It is the discretion of the ADGA judge as to if they choose to sign this paperwork. The paperwork will remain in the possession of the show secretary or judge following being completed. The secretary or judge will be responsible to mail the paperwork (this will be based on the judges preference). The AGS Member will pay a fee. Members of the Heart of Maine Dairy Goat Association will be charged a fee of \$10.00. Nonclub members will be charged a fee of \$25. The AGS member is responsible for providing a stamped addressed envelope to AGS, a check/cash for the club fees and a separate check for the AGS fees at time of request (which must be at time championship tattoo is checked).

SHOW RULES AND GUIDELINES

- 1. All animals must be inspected prior to unloading by HOMDGA or designee. Any animals showing signs of contagious and/or infectious diseases will result in the herd being asked to leave the grounds with no refund of entry fees. Animals who become sick during the show will be removed from pens and not be shown.
- 2. Entries are accepted from all Maine counties provided the herd is not under quarantine. Health papers are required from all out of state animals. Out of state exhibitors must obtain a written permit from Maine Department of Agricultural, Division of Animal Industry, Augusta, ME 04333. Permit and health papers may be checked before unloading.
- 3. Original registration papers must be presented on all animals over 6 months of age. All animals under 6 months of age may be shown with a stamped duplicate registration. A stamped duplicate is only valid for 30 days from date ADGA issues. *Stamped Duplicates are valid through December 2023 per ADGA directors*. No copies of registration papers will be accepted. Persons showing animals whose papers have been signed for transfer but have not been processed for transfer by the ADGA office must show those animals as agents for the current owner shown on ADGA records.
- 4. Base date for age computation is date of show. September 23, 2023.

- 5. Animals must be shown in their regular class to be eligible to compete in specialty classes. Animals are to be shown in the same breed in the specialty classes as they were in the regular classes. Purebreds and recorded grades MAY NOT be combined for specialty classes.
- 6. There will be NO pre-show milk out.
- 7. Entries are unlimited (except where noted in specialty classes) however no more than two premiums will be awarded per exhibitor per class. (Maine state law)
- 8. Substitutions will be allowed within a given breed only.
- 9. Tattoos must be legible to receive a leg on a championship.
- 10. Order of show will be as follows: A. Alpine, B. Nubian, C. Recorded Grade.
- D. AOP (LaMancha, Oberhasli, Saanen, Sable, Toggenburg and Guernsey), E. Nigerian Dwarf. The order of the show is subject to change and will be posted at ringside the morning of the show.
- 11. Show will start at 9:00 am on Saturday, September 23rd with the Combined Doe show. The Junior Doe show will immediately follow the Senior Doe show. Breaks will be at discretion of the show committee.
- 12. All exhibitors are encouraged to arrive on Friday, September 22nd.
- **Please do not arrive before 3:00 PM**. Exhibitors must be in place by 8:00 AM on the day of the show. Check in for the show will be from 7:30 AM to 8:30 AM on the day of the show.
- 13. Pens will be assigned by the show committee based on registration entry, according to need and availability. Please do not change pen assignments without consulting a member of the show committee first.
- 14. Entry fee refunds will only be given when the entire herd is scratched and the show secretary is notified no later than 3 days prior to the show. Breeders and herds leaving the show before the designated time will forfeit all premiums. Each doe may only receive one premium in individual competition.

MEBRA Show Rules

All riders must show proof that a horse has received its Coggins and rabies shots before being allowed to run. Youth: 18 & under as of Jan. 1st Adult: 19 & over as of Jan. 1st. *No Tank Tops allowed in the arena at any time. When you go in the arena for warm up, exhibition or anytime you are riding you must have Western attire on, unless otherwise specified.* Proper western attire is required for all events. Western shirts must be worn and kept buttoned. Shirt tails must be tucked in, or the shirt must touch the top of the pants. No polo type or t-shirts will be allowed (except on dress-down days). Slinkies can only be worn with a vest. Western boots, clean jeans or pants, and a western hat must be worn. Helmets are permitted. Rules will be enforced, excluding dress-down days that will be posted the day of the show. A penalty of \$5.00 will be assessed if the rider's hat hits the ground before crossing the finish line, or if it falls back off the head before crossing the starting line. This fee must be paid before competing in another class. Green/Novice entries cannot compete in any other classes. Participants must have prior approval from the Green/Novice committee to compete in the Green/Novice classes. Any contestant damaging the timer or property will be responsible for the repair or replacement.

A horse may only be entered once in each class, with the exception of a co-sanctioned NBHA show (see ruling for that). Excessive whipping, spurring, or hitting the horse in front of the girth will not be permitted, either in the show ring or outside of the ring!

A fee of \$7.00 will be collected from MEBRA members for the office/ring crew fund per horse and rider combination per day.

Non-members will pay a fee of \$17.00 per horse and rider combination per day. No running your horse in or outside of the ring during lunch break.

A one-minute time limit will be given to enter the ring, with a 30-second warning. A rider who is not ready to go within the one-minute time limit will be disqualified. Riders who are ready but fail to enter the ring because their horse is uncooperative will be given a second chance as the end of the class.

A rider who breaks the timer before the ring is ready will be disqualified. A rider who runs out of order will be automatically disqualified.

A knocked barrel or pole will count as a no time in all division classes. A knocked barrel or pole in a non-division class results in a 5-second penalty added to the riders time.

Purses for 3-D classes will split 50% to the 1st division, 30% to the 2nd division, and 20% to the 3rd division. Payouts will be according to MeBRA 4-D rules (number of entries).

Purses for 4-D classes will be split 35% to the 1st division, 30% to the 2nd division, 20% to the 3rd division, and 15% to the 4th division.

Payouts for 4-D Barrels and 4-D Poles will be as follows: 11 - 15 Entries = 2 places in each division (60% - 40%)

16 - 30 Entries = 3 places in each division (50% - 30% - 20%)

31 - 60 Entries = 4 places in each division (40% - 30% - 20% - 10%)

61 - 90 Entries = 5 places in each division (30% - 25% - 20% - 15% - 10%)

Ties will be handled as follows:

RULES TO GOVERN HORSES AND OXEN PULLING

Proof of rabies shots for all eligible animals required.

Must be a member of Maine Association of Livestock Exhibitors, a current Maine Association of Livestock or a certificate of insurance.

- 1. **STARTING TIME:** All teamsters to compete in contest shall have their teams ready at published time. All classes shall be closed after positions are drawn.
- 2. WEIGHING-IN: Official weigh-in for all Horses to be pulled for the week will be Tuesday at 5:00 p.m. Teams arriving later for evening classes will be allowed to weigh. Check weighing will be allowed. Official weigh-in will allow one weigh-in only by same team of Horses. Team must have halters and shoes on. Even weight only. Nothing extra for shoes and halters. All Horses will be weighed in the presence of a delegate appointed by the Fair or a person who is conducting the contest. The scale shall be balanced with a man standing on same, this man will hold all horses where possible. Teams weighing out can come back for "one" other attempt to weigh-in. Once horses and oxen have officially weighted in, all animals must remain on the grounds or will have to re-weigh upon returning.
- **3. MEASURING:** All measuring will be rope to rope.
- **4. UNHITCHING:** Team shall stay hooked to the drag at all times until time is up or the teamster wishes to stop pulling. No unhitching and re-hitching allowed.
- **5. BREAKDOWN:** An actual separation, breaking or bending of equipment shall constitute a break down. Chains, straps, eveners, not properly secured, or snarling of Horses are not considered a breakdown. Any team breaking down can take the distance pulled or return to last position and pull over. Only one (1) break down allowed.
- **6. TIME LIMIT:** 1700, 2100, & 2500 lbs. are 3 minutes, 2900, 3300, 3700, 4100 & sweepstakes are 5 minutes, All horses 5 minutes, Elimination Class horses 3 minute time limit and oxen 5 minutes.

7. USE OF REINS AND WHIPS:

The light use of reins on the hind quarters only with no over and under will be allowed. No whips, brads or goads will be allowed on Horses. With Oxen teamsters will be allowed goads without brads. The Oxen will be allowed to have only plain yoke and chain or pole that they pull up. All Bull rings, ropes, halters and so forth are not allowed in the pulling ring.

8. HELPERS:

Any number of helpers will be allowed to help hitch. After hitched on, two (2) helpers only. They shall stay behind the drag unless needed to help teamsters in snarls or turns. On Oxen, helper must enter ring ahead of team. Helpers will hook team and are not allowed to slap animals in any way. If this happens, the team will be DISQUALIFIED. The helper must stay behind the drag at all times after being hitched on. Head yoke considered to be plain yoke.

9. GENERAL:

All participants will be properly dressed. Proper language must be used at all times. Any participant under the influence of liquor or illegal substance will be disqualified from contest. The drinking of intoxicating beverages in and around the ring is prohibited.

10. SPLITTING OFTEAMS:

Splitting of teams will be allowed in classes Open to the World.

11. USE OF DRUGS:

Use of drugs or stimulant is Prohibited. The Fair or person conducting contest reserves the right to saliva test any animal after pulling. The owner and teamster found to have used a drug or stimulant shall be barred from this Association.

12. CARE OF PULLING RING:

The ring will be taken care of as well as is possible by the Fair or person conducting contest to have an even and fair pull.

13. DRAWING OF POSITIONS:

Numbers shall be placed in a container according to the position of the team weighed in or entered. A disinterested person at ringside shall draw all the numbers to determine the position the team shall draw.

14. VARIATIONS:

If any situations arise that are not covered by these rules, the decision will be left to the discretion of the judges.

15. Teams will be ready at all times and must report in the pulling ring immediately.

(3 to 5 minutes limit, at discretion of Supt.) Any unusual delay will forfeit right to pull in that class. Teams will be allowed 3 minutes to hitch after drag is set.

- **16.** Any animal caught under the drag is disqualified and must unhitch immediately.
- 17. All Ponies must be under 58inches.
- 18. No blankets allowed in the exercise area.
- 19. The management reserves the right to reject any entry form from all teams (Oxen and Horses) not found in satisfactory condition at time of weigh-in. There shall be two timekeepers, each of whom shall have a stopwatch. The management also reserves the right to accept or reject any entry, to close or re-open any class, to set ahead or change program on account of weather conditions or change in track, if deemed necessary for the best interests of the Fair. Horses at all times shall be under the discretion of the Superintendent of this department, to whom all inquiries should be directed for further information.

20. THREE HORSE HITCH:

Any Horse must weigh at least 1400 lbs. They must hitch side by side and be driven by one man. Single Horse hitch shall be driven by one man - no leading.

- 21. FCAS will require to see a certificate of entering competitors liability insurance for each farm or individual.
- 22. 15 ft. Pull Rules are the same as the 6 ft. Rules, "only 2 tries allowed."
- 23. FCAS has adopted the Rules of the Maine Draft Horse & Ox Association, as Revised January 2003.
- 24. No Bulls will be allowed to pull or be in the pulling ring.
- 25. All pulling animals must stay off the paved roads. (Go to pulling ring though the field)

4-H GENERAL RULES

- 1. At the discretion of the judges, no award may be given.
- 2. The Franklin County Agricultural Society has determined that the eligible age limits for 4-H youths participating for premiums and awards in the Franklin County Agricultural Fair shall be that the boy/girl enrolled in the regular 4-H program must have reached his/her 9th birthday or must not have reached his/her 19th birthday on January 1 of the current year. Any boy/girl from outside Franklin County who wishes to compete for premium awards in 4-H events at this Fair must meet the Franklin County Agricultural Society age requirements.
- 3. All 4-H members must have an "Approval Form for 4-H Animal Shows" signed by the Extension Educator from their County Office and any required registration certificates that will identify their 4-H animals.
- 4. The Danish system of judging will be used in all 4-H shows, unless otherwise specified.
- 5. 4-H members must show their **OWN** animals unless excused by the 4-H leader from Franklin County responsible for the specific show and will not collect premium.
- 6. In all 4-H livestock breed shows, no animal can be selected Junior, Senior, Grand or Reserve Champion of the breed unless it is registered. In all other classes, in each breed show, unregistered animals may compete, but must be representative of the breed being shown.
- 7. The Grand Champion animal in each livestock breed is selected from the first place animals in the preceding classes unless a Junior Champion has been chosen, in which case the Grand Champion will be chosen from the Junior and Senior Champion classes.
- 8. In projects selecting a Reserve Champion, the Reserve will be selected from the remaining first place winners and second place animal from the class which produced the Grand Champion. If a Junior Champion has been selected, the Reserve will be chosen from the Junior Champion class, remaining first place cow classes and the second place animal from the class producing the Grand Champion.
- In Showmanship classes of all 4-H livestock shows, the junior and intermediate age
 groups may be moved up or down to equalize number of entries in each class
 if desired.
- 10. Except as may be otherwise stated under some specific livestock classes, any 4-H member exhibiting at this Fair, must have been enrolled in the project involved on or before April 1st of the current year.
 - 11. The Franklin County Agricultural Society will be responsible for all final decisions regarding 4-H show rules and regulations.
 - 12. Since education is the goal of 4-H animal projects, 4-H members should prepare their own animals for showing*.
- 13. Senior exhibitors are limited to 5 animals per dept., sheep and goats 7 animals
- 14. Intermediate exhibitors are limited to 4 animals per dept., sheep and goats 6 animals
- 15. Junior exhibitors are limited to 3 animals per dept., sheep and goats 5 animals

REGULATIONS FOR 4-H OPEN SHOWS*

- a. January 1 is the base date for age of exhibitor.
- b. 4-H exhibitor must have turned 9 before midnight December 31, but not be 19 before midnight December 31. This assures that any exhibitor, in a 4-H open show ring, will be of official 4-H age 9-19. Examples: 8 on December 31 = not eligible to show in coming year. 9 on January 1 = eligible to show in present year. 18 on December 31 = eligible to show in coming year. 19 on January 1 = not eligible to show in present year.
- c. No one may exhibit or assist in the livestock show ring who has not reached their 9th birth day on January 1st of the show year or who's 19+onJanuary1st of the show year.
- d. Leased animals will be permitted in 4-H open show.
- e. All open shows will require that exhibitors present the standard "Approval Form for 4-H Animal Shows."
- f. Novice showmen are considered 1st year 4-H members only. (Not 1st year in project unless participating in 4-H Lead line.)
- *An open show is a fair that invites participants from more than one county, so participants should be included as presented to the fair from the State 4-H Office

The Franklin County Agricultural Society will afford the best protection possible for exhibits, but Extension and the FCAS disclaim any liability for losses or damage to exhibits.
- 4. Each entry must have a standard 4-H Exhibit & Judging Card securely attached to the exhibit. Both cards are available at the Extension Office. Both sections on the card must be filled out completely. Include the <u>project level</u> if the project has one. Otherwise write the number of years the member has been in the project in the <u>Unit Level Space</u>. Include your age as of December 31, 2023 in the age space of the card. Any special considerations that should be taken in to account by the judges should be written on a Post-It-Note attached to the 4-H Exhibit & Judging Card by the leader.
- **5.** Arrive Friday evening by 5 p.m. Projects including food may be entered Saturday morning until 10:00a.m.
- **6.** NO KITS will be accepted, except in the following Craft categories Latch Hook Rugs, Candle making, and Stitchery. By kits we mean articles made of pre-cut or pre-formed pieces that are only assembled by the 4-H member.
- **7.** No posters or written school reports allowed, except a specifically noted in a project category Sizes include scrap book page size or 8 1/2 x 11.
- **8.** All 4-H exhibits must be in place in the Exhibition Hall at the designated time or they will not be judged.
- 9. Use only clear plastic wrap- no colored plastic wrap. Use of paper plates is advised. The Fair is not responsible for lost or broken containers.
- 10. Due to fire hazards please do not use hay, sawdust, or shavings in exhibits.
- 11. The judging will be done on the "Danish System". Each worthy exhibit will be awarded a ribbon and a premium on the basis of how well it displays appropriate skills for the member's age and number of years in the project.

Items must be from the current 4-H year; or four regular size photos that tell a story, mounted as a unit and individually labeled. Separate entries may be submitted for each species of animal as long as each is conducted as a separate project. Poultry members may submit one-half dozen eggs with breed of hen identified instead of photos or an "item the member has made" related to learning about the project. Exhibits may be entered for animals that are shown at the fair. No live animals displayed. This "Animal Projects" category includes all animals not specifically mentioned elsewhere in these rules. 4-H members may choose to exhibit a maximum of three items, however, each item must fall under 1 of the following 4categories:

Lot 1

HEALTH & SAFETY — An item made by member or four pictures describing or illustrating health and/or safety of animal (no first aid kits).

Lot 2

NUTRITION — An item displaying the vital nutrients needed for this animal (labeled) or show examples (labeled) of feed and analysis.

Lot 3

HABITAT/HOUSING — 4 pictures with captions showing habitat/conditions, housing, or pasture management, etc. Or a model made by youth of housing or habitat conditions. NO KITS, Please.

Lot 4

TRAINING — 4 pictures with captions explaining age of animal, what the training is, what you are doing and why you are doing it. Or an item made by youth which may be used in training of an animal. Label item and tell what it is used for.

Lot 5

Value added products item made from animal products IE: Soap, Lotion, etc.

Class B - CHILD DEVELOPMENT, CARE, BABYSITTING

Items made may pertain to child nutrition, strategies, safety procedures, etc. when caring for children. Or a written summary up to 4 photos which relates to the development of children.

Pictures may be mounted in an album or on a piece of foam board or poster board. Place captions under each photo. Pictures maybe color or black and white.
